

New Sigma Nu House in the Works

Plans for the new Sigma Nu house are underway. This modern, fully-functional house will be located at the same site as the current house on Fraternity Park Drive. The brick house with wrap around patio will include the following:

- 18 redesigned dorm rooms with sleeping and expanded storage facilities
- Interior rooms (chapter room, living room, TV room, chapter office, and women's powder room)
- Required fire sprinkler and smoke systems

- Elevator and other ADA compliance items
- · ADA accessible first floor suite
- Modern computer and information technology connections to the campus community
- Full-service kitchen
- Ample storage space

The new house will meet and exceed all required safety codes with proper fire escapes, fire sprinklers, kitchen facilities, heating and air conditioning, and plumbing facilities. Although costly, these features ensure a durable and safe house of the highest quality. The new Sigma Nu house will allow Epsilon Eta brothers to live, work, and learn in a safe and comfortable environment for years to come.

To continue our legendary existence at the University of Tennessee, it is up to all Epsilon Eta alumni to invest in the brotherhood and new Sigma Nu house.
